Credit-Bearing Course List Summer School

Choosing Your Course

Middlesex University Summer School offers approximately 140 courses in 14 subject areas. Both credit-bearing and non-credit bearing courses are offered. CUNY students **MUST** take credit-bearing courses in order to receive academic credit for course-work done at Middlesex University Summer School. On the next page is a list of credit-bearing courses offered in summer of 2004.. Visit www.mdx.ac.uk/summer for an up-to-date listing of this year's summer courses.

Course codes, levels and prerequisites

Each credit-bearing course is listed with a Middlesex University course code. The course code consists of three letters and four numbers (e.g. FRE1011 and BUS3700). The letters refer to the subject area (e.g. BUS refers to the Business subject area). For accredited courses, the first figure of the code number pertains to the level of the course. Level 1 (introductory) refers to the first year of a degree program, level 2 to intermediate, level 3 final year honors level and level 4 postgraduate (e.g. BUS3700 is an honors level Business course). While background subject knowledge for level 1 courses is useful, it is not essential. Courses at levels 2 or 3 are likely to require previous knowledge of the subject area. This knowledge may have been gained through formal or informal study or work experience. The level of previous knowledge required is indicated in each course listing, either as part of the text or under the heading of 'prerequisites'

Credit explained

Courses carry either 10 or 20 credit points based on the standard UK 120-credit academic year. Each 20-credit course consists of approximately 38 hours of class contact time (seminar, studio, fieldwork and/or lecture). About half as much class contact time is involved in 10-credit modules. To allow for different credit systems, 20 UK credit points are equivalent to between 3 and 5 North American credit points. CSI students earn 4 credits per course taken at Middlesex University. US students may study up to 40 North American credit points during the summer program. **Note:** one 20-credit course is included in the Middlesex summer program cost; a second course has an additional cost.

Academic Environment

Middlesex University Summer School has small, informal classes, averaging 15 students that allow teachers to offer input and support to individuals and for students to explore ideas in depth. The emphasis is on seminars and feedback is encouraged. However, the teaching pattern can include a variety of learning situations. Courses are taught by Middlesex lecturers and supported where appropriate by outside practitioners. All courses (except languages) are taught in English.

Assessment

Assessment varies from subject to subject but most courses are based on a combination of coursework and a final project or examination. Assessment requirements vary from course to course (exact assessment patterns are given under each course listing). Examinations take place on 9, 10 and 11 August. Most coursework is due on Friday, August 6, 2004, but it may vary.
